	on food gathering knowledge and customs, today's scientific names for plants,			
	and complete mini-research outline on three wild plants used by the Osage. 4.			
	Introduction to the Buffalo: Students read text summarizing importance, view			
	poster of traditional uses of bison & evaluate most important, complete			
	connect dots activity. 5. Intertribal Buffalo Council: Students read webpage of			
	IBC and compare Native Nations' use of bison to white settlers and hunters,			
	and learn about revitalization efforts; complete review questions. 6. Bison			
	Science - Research: Students research The Animal and Conservation efforts of			
	bison in Osage area. 7. Perspectives on Bison : Students choose an article, and			
	interpret its unique perspective on the bison; write a summary including			
	paraphrasing and quotations. 8. Food-ways, Exercise & Health : Students			
	compare food traditions of past to those today; recognize loss of connection to			
	food production and lack of exercise; they complete a chart outlining physical			
	exercise (aerobic + strengthening) involved in early Osage food-ways; then			
	design food-producing exercise plan for today (gardening, etc.).
