Review Questions

1. What does “DAPOSKA A^KODAPY” mean in English? **Our school**
2. See below: the word “**immersion**” has different meanings. Which one would fit the Osage Immersion School? Letter **C**

im·mer·sion (*noun*)

A. the action of immersing someone or something in a liquid.

"his back was still raw from **immersion in** the icy Atlantic Ocean"

B. deep mental involvement.

"his **immersion in** Jewish culture"

C. a method of teaching a foreign language by the exclusive use of that language, usually at a special school.

3. The other meaning of the word “immerse” is “to dip or submerge in a liquid.” Using this as an analogy, what is the “liquid” in the Immersion School into which students are “immersed”? **Osage Language (and culture)**
4. How would you describe the Osage Immersion School to someone?
(varies) where small children learn and speak Osage while in school
5. What age students go there? **aged 6 weeks to 1st Grade**
6. Why is this school for younger children? **Easier to learn language at young age**
7. Regarding language learning, what is required of parents or guardians who have children in the Immersion School, and why? **to regularly attend approved Osage Language classes, so students can use Osage language at home as well as in school, to learn it better**
8. Examine the phrases in Goal No. 1. Besides learning Osage language and culture in a positive environment, who would Osage students be surrounded with at this special school (as opposed to a regular public school)? **Positive Osage role models**
9. The school goals are not just to teach Osage language - what other important subject is taught? See goal No. 3: “Integrate Osage **culture** and language into each student’s daily learning environment.” What does this word mean to you? **(answers vary) how people live, customs, traditions, and values, i.e. religion, food, social customs, music, arts, material objects**
