- 4. What does the color black symbolize? Night, moon, and death
- 5. Choose one color's symbolism, and explain why you think it might have this meaning:

 (answers vary: red is warmth and energy like heat and sun; black is dark like night, etc)
- 6. Where did Native Americans get glass beads? from trade with Europeans
- 7. What are 3 items Osage made from wood? Cradleboards, bowls, flutes, pipe stems, bows
- Invented by Osage after Europeans came, ribbonwork combines <u>European</u>
 materials with <u>Native</u> <u>American</u> motifs and color symbolism.
- Describe the process involved in ribbonwork: <u>cutting and folding strips of fabric, and then</u>
 <u>sewing them in the form of designs onto clothing and blankets.</u>
- 10. Why didn't Osage men war the military coats given to them? they were too small
- 11. What did the women do with the coats? Decorated and wore at weddings & formal events
